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## ABOUT CORNELL UNIVERSITY

Cornell University is the federal land-grant institution of New York State, a private endowed university, a member of the Ivy League, and a partner of the State University of New York. It has been described as the first truly American university because of its founders' revolutionarily egalitarian and practical vision of higher education, and is dedicated to its land-grant mission of outreach and public service. Founded in 1865 by Ezra Cornell and Andrew Dickson White, Cornell was intended to teach and make contributions in all fields of knowledge. These ideals are captured in Cornell's motto, a popular 1865 Ezra Cornell quotation: "I would found an institution where any person can find instruction in any study."

## ABOUT ITHACA, NY

Ithaca, NY, home to Cornell University and Ithaca College, is one of the best known and best loved "college towns" in the nation. Students make up a sizable portion of the population and even have a mini commercial district on the edge of campus. Located in the Finger Lakes region in the middle of the state of New York, Ithaca draws tourists to its waterfalls and gorges, its wineries, its restaurants, and hiking trails. A small city in a rural part of the state, Ithaca is known for its engaged citizens, cooperative ventures, and an emerging start-up sector. Put simply, students find plenty of ways to be active beyond the classroom and campus whether in the community or out in nature.

## STUDENT APPLICATIONS

Eligibility $\quad$ Evidence of solid academic preparation in general and in the proposed field(s) of study; a minimum of one- and one-half years of continuous full-time university study; an equivalent to a United States' Grade Point Average of 3.0, on a 4.0 scale. Note: exchange students tend to be among top of the class of their respective institutions.
TOEFL and IELTS are the primary tests accepted. Duolingo is also acceptable. More information for international students is available on the Undergraduate Admissions website.

TOEFL iBT or Special Home edition: 100 and up IELTS: 7.5 and up Duolingo: 120 and up

Nomination Procedures

Application Procedures
Nominated students will receive an e-mail from the Office of Global Learning with further instructions on accessing the online application. The following documents must be submitted by the nominated student as part of the online application:

- Statement of purpose
- Transcripts of all undergraduate (or graduate) work
- List of Cornell courses of interest
- Scanned copy of passport
- Proof of English proficiency, if relevant
- Declaration of Finances (form will be provided; student must submit form with a recent bank letter or statement)
All exchange students who are not US citizens are required to have a student visa for their studies in the United States. The undergraduate admissions office will prepare necessary paperwork (I-20) and the

| COURSE INFORMATION |  |
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| Home College/Department/Major | Exchange students accepted at Cornell will be admitted into a major in the college or unit participating in the exchange. It is expected that students applying to the exchange program will be interested in taking the majority of their classes in this college or unit. Enrollment in classes in other colleges at Cornell is possible but cannot be guaranteed. <br> Only students in business degree programs can apply to the Dyson School of Applied Economics and Management or the Nolan School of Hotel Administration as their Home College. <br> Graduate degree programs and professional colleges and schools (Law, Veterinary Medicine, SC Johnson College of Business, Cornell Tech, Weill Cornell Medical School) are not included in undergraduate exchange agreements. |
| Academic restrictions | Exchange students will be permitted to enroll in any course for which they are qualified, subject to meeting admission requirements, prerequisites, and timetable and capacity constraints at Cornell. However, there are specific academic restrictions to bear in mind: <br> - Exchange students are unable to take courses in Computer Science (CS). Related subjects may be found in other departments (Electrical and Computer Engineering; Information Science, Systems, and Technology; or Operations Research and Information Engineering). <br> - Studio classes (architecture, art, design, and fashion) are typically not available to students through general exchange agreements. <br> - Senior capstone courses as well as first year writing seminars are not available to exchange students. <br> - Courses associated with professional graduate degree programs in any college are not available to non-degree students. <br> - Generally, undergraduate exchange students are not approved to take graduate-level courses. |
| Registration / Course Enrollment | Admitted students will receive information about registering for courses from their college. In most cases, exchange students will enroll in courses after matriculated (regular, full-time) Cornell students. Exchange students may find that certain courses are closed or already full. It is important to be flexible with course selection and schedules. While students are asked to provide initial course requests at the time of application, this does not constitute enrollment. <br> Course changes are possible during the first two weeks of classes in advance of the "Add/Drop" deadline. |


| Course Load | Exchange students on F-1 visas are required to maintain full-time status <br> while studying in the United States. Students must enroll in a <br> minimum of 12 credits per semester during the academic year. <br> Most exchange students enroll in 14-16 credits per semester. Exceeding <br> 16 credits is not recommended. |
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| Course Roster | Course descriptions can be accessed through the Courses of Study at <br> courses.cornell.edu. If viewing before the upcoming year's Courses of <br> Study is published, use the most current version of the Courses of <br> Study. Normally the course descriptions will indicate if they are to run <br> in the following year. <br> Actual course availability and class times are NOT listed in the Courses <br> of Study. This information is listed in the Class Roster at <br> classes.cornell.edu. Note: the class roster for the appropriate semester <br> may not be available at the time the student completes their <br> application. <br> We cannot guarantee enrollment in any course. Enrollment <br> permission is often subject to class size limitations, the consent of <br> instructors, and demonstrated academic qualifications in the form of <br> prerequisites. |
| Advising | Exchange students continue to be supported by an advisor in the Office <br> of Global Learning. Exchange students may be assigned an advisor in <br> their home college for academic matters. Depending on the college they <br> may have a faculty advisor as well. |
| Grading Scale | The official university grading system is composed of letter grades with <br> pluses and minuses. Passing grades range from A+ to D-; F is failing. |


| POST-ACCEPTANCE INFORMATION |  |
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| Housing | Housing is limited and not guaranteed for exchange students. <br> $\bullet$ Fall semester: Finding housing can be very challenging. On- <br> campus housing is not available, and single-semester leases <br> within commuting distance are difficult to secure. |
| -Spring semester: Housing may be available on-campus and is <br> generally easy to find off-campus. <br> - Academic year: Off-campus only |  |
|  | Note: Upon nomination to Cornell we encourage students to begin <br> searching for housing. However, students should not commit to <br> housing (financially or otherwise) until they have received admission <br> notification from Cornell and have secured a visa appointment. <br> On-campus housing: living.sas.cornell.edu/live/apply/ <br> Off-campus living: ccengagement.cornell.edu/off-campus-living |
| Meals | Cornell University offers many dining plan options for students who <br> want to have a full or partial meal plan. Restaurants and groceries are <br> available in the Collegetown neighborhood next to campus and by bus. |


| Orientation and Events | All incoming students are expected to attend new student orientation <br> programs. More information on general Cornell orientation for <br> undergraduates can be found here: newstudents.cornell.edu <br> Exchange students also attend a campus-wide Exchange orientation at <br> the beginning of each semester, in addition to applicable College- <br> specific orientation events. |
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|  <br> Immunizations | All students are enrolled in Cornell's Student Health Plan insurance. <br> This is mandatory and cannot be waived by international students <br> unless they are covered by an acceptable U.S. employer-based health <br> insurance plan. |
| Costs | All students must show proof of immunizations as part of the student <br> on-boarding process. |
| Exchange students do not pay Cornell tuition, but are responsible for <br> charges that will be billed through the Cornell Bursar system: <br> $\bullet$ <br> - Student Health Plan insurance |  |

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| Student and Campus Life | Cornell offers many ways to get involved through student groups, club <br> sports, community service, and more. Cornell is famous for its student <br> clubs. With 1,000 student clubs across the university, there is <br> something for everyone. |
| Cornell Health | Cornell Health provides a wide range of health care services (see page <br> for international students and new students). Services include physical <br> and mental health care, lab testing and x-rays, pharmacy, physical and <br> occupational therapy, alcohol and other drug services, nutrition <br> counseling, sexual health care and gender services, immunization, <br> travel medicine, and allergy shots. Cornell Health partners closely with <br> our local hospital, Cayuga Medical Center. |

| Disability Services | Cornell Health is the home to the Student Disability Services Office (SDS). In order for students to get the most out of their exchange at Cornell, it is best for students to inform their home university's exchange officials and relevant Cornell colleagues early regarding any academic or physical accommodations that may be needed. |
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| Emergency Services | Cornell University has 24/7 Emergency Response with multiple units able to respond to different emergency situations, most notably the Cornell Police (+1 607-255-1111). Cornell has special resources for Sexual Harassment and Assault - Response and Education (SHARE). |
| Cornell Library | Cornell University has a world-class research library with extensive print and digital resources in support of teaching, learning, and research along with popular study areas for individuals and groups. |
| IT Services | Cornell offers a wide array of IT services to students, including collaboration software, network printing, and computer labs. |
| Learning Strategies Center | The LSC provides academic support, including supplemental instruction for specific courses and peer tutoring. |
| Identity Resources | Cornell's emphasis on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion is a focus of the Dean of Student's Office and multiple resource centers including the Asian \& Asian American Resource Center, the LGBT Resource Center, the Multicultural Student Leadership Empowerment, the Women's Resource Center, and the Office of Spirituality and Meaning Making.
